
## Stuff written in Pastor Rob's Bible:



I accidentally drove by the bakery this morning and there in the window was a host of goodies. I felt this was no accident, so I prayed, "Lord, it is up to you. If you want me to have any of those delicious baked goods, create a parking place for me directly in front of the bakery." And sure enough, God answered my prayer! On the eighth time round the block, there it was!



C.S. Lewis argues that it takes a community of people to get to know an individual person. Reflecting on his own friendships, he observed that some aspects of one of his friend's personality were brought out only through interaction with a second friend. That meant it he lost the second friend, he lost the part of his first friend that was otherwise invisible. "By myself I am not large enough to call the whole man into activity; I want other lights than my own to show all his facets." If it takes a community to know an ordinary human being, how much more necessary would it be to get to know Jesus alongside others? By praying with friends, you will be able to hear and see facets of Jesus that you have not yet perceived.

That is why, Lewis thinks, that the angels in Isaiah 6 are crying, "Holy, Holy, Holy" to one another. Each angel is communicating to all the rest the part of the glory it sees. Knowing the Lord is communal and cumulative, we must pray and praise together. That way "the more we share the Heavenly Bread between us, the more we shall all have."

#### Who, me? Yes, you!

The Bible is filled with people who don't feel up to the challenge of serving God, speaking for God or leading his people. But God always knows what he's doing. Pastor Haviland Houston issues this challenge: "When you are hesitant to act, or feel a failure of nerve coming on, when courage lags, or even if laziness and the 'I don't care' blues get you down, may the words of Mordecai to Esther burn in your hearts and minds: 'And who knows whether you have not come to the kingdom for such a time as this?'" (See Esther 4:14.)

Max Lucado offers a similar reminder in You Were Made for This Moment. "God always has his person," he writes, also citing the book of Esther. "When we feel as though everything is falling apart, God working in our midst, causing everything to fall into place. He is the King of quiet providence, and he invites you and me to partner with him in his work." Lucado continues: "[God] has a Joseph for every famine and a David for every Goliath. When his people need rescuing, God calls a Rahab into service. When a baby Moses needs a mama, God prompts an Egyptian princess to have compassion. He always has his person. He had someone in the story of Esther. And in your story he has you."

#### Listen to the loving voice...

Figurative thieves are all around: Illness steals time and energy. Inflation robs many of financial stability. The bandit of social media chips away at our productivity, self-esteem, quality time with loved ones. Prejudice and oppression prey on certain groups of people. Doubtless, you can think of other thieves and bandits.

But above their noise, listen for another sound: A warm voice whose loving tone calls us by name. A voice that puts us at ease because it's familiar as a favorite blanket, a path we can walk in the dark, a song we know by heart. That voice rising above any force that would steal and kill and destroy is, according to John 10, the loving voice of God made known in Jesus, caring for us as a good shepherd does his sheep. And lest you get confused, thinking God is angry and judgmental, think again. That is the sound of thieves and bandits; don't listen to them, don't follow them, don't give them your heart! "I came," says Jesus the Shepherd-Gate-Messiah-Savior, "that [you] may have life and have it abundantly"

## Solving the Parenting Conflict: Relationship or Firmness?

Dad watched as Jacob and Mom went at it again. There was Mom letting Jacob off the hook again. Dad was convinced that all Jacob needed was some serious consequences to get him to straighten up. A few hours later, Dad had his chance, and boy did he dish out the consequences for what Jacob tried to pull this time. Mom stood by and watched quietly, feeling uneasy about how firm Dad was being with Jacob. She just knew Jacob felt disconnected and needed more support.

This went on daily but neither Mom nor Dad talked about it. They learned years ago not to. Mom felt crushed the last time Dad said anything about how soft she was with Jacob, and Dad felt disrespected when Mom tried to stop him from dishing out consequences. Both knew this wasn't what God intended, but neither had any idea how to move forward.

#### **Different Strengths in Parenting**

God often brings together a husband and wife where one parent specializes in using relationship in discipline and the other in firmness. Early on, they try to be on the same page, but as the children grow older and misbehavior becomes more complex, each parent often defaults to what they believe is best.

At first, they will try to help each other, but that "help" often comes at the wrong times and leads to fights. Each parent learns not to say anything but believes in their heart they are right.

"She just needs to be firmer with Jacob." "He just needs to be more graceful with Jacob." They say only to themselves ... and a chasm develops. Communication about parenting either becomes negative or stops altogether.

#### A Multifaceted Approach

But it doesn't have to be this way. Children need both relationship and firmness as part of a multifaceted approach to parenting that focuses on the heart.

It's important to set firm and clear boundaries, especially in areas where our children struggle. This approach teaches and nurtures them, helping them develop wisdom and character that align with God's principles. Firmness should not be cold or harsh.

But discipline should always be rooted in a loving relationship. When it becomes necessary to increase discipline, it's equally important to increase moments of fun, affirmation, and closeness. These elements must work

together. A balanced approach that includes love and encouragement creates a nurturing environment where children feel secure and valued.

#### **God's Example**

Romans 5:8 tells us that God demonstrated His own love for us in that while we were still sinners Christ died for us. God starts with love and builds a relationship first. God does not expect us to change prior to a relationship with Him. He began working on a relationship with us while we were still sinners.

But Hebrews 12:6 tells us that God disciplines those that He loves. There will be times when God confronts us about our sin and desires for us to change. Yet when God calls us to repentance for our sin, He has this amazing way of making clear that our sin is not acceptable and yet we are always loved. A prayer of repentance with Jesus should lead us to feeling more loved and closer to Him than when that prayer time began. This is our goal in parenting as well.

Our children don't need parents who have this perfect balancing act between relationship and firmness figured out because the truth is that these two heart tools are not in tension with one another. They are designed to work together. Our children need parents that love them deeply and are relationally close enough that when they need to be firm, those moments end in closer relationships. Even when we're correcting, we need to be connecting.

#### **A New Beginning**

Fortunately for Jacob, his parents decided to start learning about using a heart-based approach to parenting. They began reading books and watching some videos, and this opened up lines of communication between Mom and Dad that had been closed for years.

As Mom and Dad learned about the different heart tools God's given parents, they began talking about how to use these heart tools with Jacob. The conversation was no longer about what each of them thought the other was doing wrong. Instead, it was about Jacob's heart, what it needed, and how they could start using these heart tools together to bring about lasting change. As they got to work and saw positive changes, Jacob's parents realized that

their different parenting styles did not need to be at odds. In fact, God wanted them to learn from each other

#### Scripture Reading: Habakkuk 1:1-4; 2:1-4

In faith, there is enough light for those who want to believe and enough shadows to blind those who don't. —Blaise Pascal



After WW II, the Allied powers established the International Military Tribunal (IMT) to bring Nazi leaders to justice for crimes against peace, war crimes, crimes against humanity, and conspiracy to commit any of the foregoing crimes.

Why do I bring this up? Because, in less than two weeks, we will observe the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of a major development in the so-called Nuremberg trials. On October 18, 1945, an indictment against 24 major war criminals and seven organizations was filed with the trial itself beginning on November 20. In all, 199 defendants were tried, 161 were convicted, and 37 were sentenced to death.

It is safe to say that most people who had suffered at the hands of the Nazis were relieved that those who had perpetrated untold atrocities upon other human beings were getting what they deserved. They were punished, and it was only right that they were.

Habakkuk would've approved. As it is, when we find him in our reading for today, he is in a bad mood. He does not like the way God is handling foreign affairs. He does not think God is going a very good job.

Do we ever feel this way? Have you ever looked around at the world and felt like Habakkuk — frustrated, confused, maybe even angry? You see injustice flourishing, corruption unchecked, and people who do evil seemingly getting ahead. Meanwhile, the faithful struggle, and God seems silent.

While it is unlikely we have suffered as the world did for almost a decade while the Nazis were in power, we still bridle, do we not, at the slightest provocation? Like Habakkuk, we complain, "O LORD, how long shall I cry for help, and you will not listen? Or cry to you 'Violence!' and you will not save?" (1:2). Habakkuk's complaint is not new. But he did learn something. God's delay is not the same thing as God's absence. God told him, "Look at the nations and see! Be astonished! Be astounded! For a work is being done in your days that you would not believe if you were told" (1:5). God sees the wickedness and is neither blind nor inactive, but we must trust God's timing, not ours. In the meantime, God says, "The righteous live by their faith" (2:4).

Prayer: O God, help me to live by faith and not by sight. Amen.

#### Scripture Reading: 2 Kings 5:1-3, 7-15c

God sees our wounds, our brokenness, our weariness. And in his hands, what is shattered can be restored. —Max Lucado





If it's not broken, don't fix it. We're familiar with this time-tested adage, and it rings true. But what about humans? Can we be repaired? Can we be healed?

When you think about it, the human body has a strong repairability index. But what about the soul? What about the mind? What about relationships? What about a marriage? What about the human heart?

The case of the Assyrian commander in today's reading is an interesting one, because here's a guy who gets a two-fer: Both his body and soul are healed! Naaman was sick. "He suffered from leprosy" (v. 1). It was a diagnosis no one wanted to hear. You can imagine Naaman seeing his doctor, and praying to himself, "Don't let it be leprosy! Don't let it be leprosy."

His fears were justified. It was a terrible, disfiguring disease. The Bible says, "Though a mighty warrior, [he] suffered from leprosy." This is the thing about disease: *it is no respecter of persons*. He was a big man. A powerful man. A wealthy man. But he had leprosy, and had to bear the social stigma that went with it.

Naaman learned that *repairs require faith*, and after humbling himself and following the prophet Elisha's prescription (dipping into the Jordan River seven times), he was healed.

This business of seeking a cure for a disease is tricky. On one hand, we are all headed for death. It is a destination none of us can avoid. At some point, the body is not fixable. But what about our hearts, souls and minds? Yes, these too can be healed and fixed.

Do you ever feel wounded, scarred, broken and falling apart? You, too, can be "repaired." That's what Jesus is all about. Repairs are guaranteed. As the gospel song puts it:

He's the healer of broken hearts, / He'll mend your shattered dreams.

He'll pick up all the threads / Of your broken life

And weave them together again.

To your soul, he'll bring peace and joy.

A friend in need he'll be. / The healer of broken hearts

Is Jesus of Galilee.



#### Scripture Reading: Luke 18:9-14

### Humility is not thinking less of yourself; it's thinking of yourself less. —Rick Warren



In today's reading, Jesus tells a story about two men, a tax man and a Pharisee. He has high praise for the former and contempt for the latter. Let's take a closer look. The first thing we notice — perhaps with disappointment — is that this reading is not about taxes and tax collectors at all! It is rather about the best way to get on God's good side.

Jesus expressed this somewhat more theologically: "I tell you, this man went down to his home justified rather than the other; for all who exalt themselves will be humbled, but all who humble themselves will be exalted" (v. 14).

We get on God's good side by humbly confessing that we're sinners in need of God's redemptive mercy.

The Pharisee didn't get this. Notice that everything in his prayer is true. Unfortunately, it was truth fish-wrapped in pride disguised as gratitude. "God, I thank you." So far so good. Then he crossed a line: "... that I am not like other people: thieves, rogues, adulterers" (v. 11). He might've been okay if he'd stopped right there. But no, he had to keep going, "... or even like this tax-collector." This guy forgot that God loves thieves, rogues, adulterers and tax collectors! God even loves you and me!

Truth is, we don't really like people who are proud and full of themselves, do we? Sadly, it's hard for such people to get on God's good side. We prefer to be around those who can see beyond themselves, who show evident concern in the welfare of others, who take an interest in us, who seek justice and walk humbly with God, as the prophet Micah noted.

For example, I'm thinking of the leader who serves rather than bossing people around; the CEO who spends time learning employees' names, listening to their concerns, and even doing some of their tasks to understand their struggles. Or the physics teacher who corrects a student in class, only to later realize she misunderstood the situation. Instead of doubling down in pride, she publicly apologizes to the student, modeling that true humility means owning mistakes and valuing truth over ego. Or the woman who notices an elderly neighbor struggling to maintain his yard. Quietly, she mows his lawn, pulls weeds, and leaves fresh flowers by his door. She never tells anyone.

Humility. The tax collector had it when he prayed the "Sinner's Prayer." We, too, can clothe ourselves in these attractive garments when we walk humbly with God and our neighbor


